

Libraries in Lawrence, Massachusetts for Cambridge College Students

Traditional library arrangements:

If you live in Massachusetts, you will be able to get a borrowing card for full use of many college libraries in the Lawrence area. To get into these college libraries, you need a card for the NOBLE library system. You may already have this card if you live in a city in the NOBLE system. If you live in a town that is not in the NOBLE system, you will have to take an extra step but it will be worth it! Here's what you do:

NOBLE system: If you live in: *Beverly, Danvers, Everett, Gloucester, Lynn, Lynnfield, Marblehead, Melrose, Peabody, Reading, Revere, Salem, Saugus, Stoneham, Swampscott, Wakefield, or Winthrop* **you are already in the NOBLE system.** All you need is a current library card from your local public library. If you don't have one, call your local library to find out how to get a card. ***With a NOBLE system card, you have full privileges at all the public libraries in this group, plus the academic libraries listed below.***

Merrimack Valley System: If you live in *Andover, Billerica, Boxford, Burlington, Carlisle, Chelmsford, Dracut, Dunstable, Essex, Groveland, Georgetown, Hamilton/Wenham, Haverill, Ipswich, Lawrence, Littleton, Lowell, Manchester-by-the-Sea, Merrimack, Methuen, Middleton, Newbury, Newburyport, N. Andover, N. Reading, Rockport, Rowley, Salisbury, Tewksbury, Topsfield, Tyngsboro, West Newbury, Westford, or Wilmington* **you are in the Merrimack Valley Library system**, and you have full privileges at all the public libraries in this group. ***However, you will want to use college libraries. To do that, you will need a card for the NOBLE system. Here's how to get one:***

- get a current library card from your local library
- take that card and a picture ID (driver's license) to the circulation desk of any of the libraries listed in the paragraph above which begins "NOBLE system:"
- Ask for a borrowing card for the NOBLE system

Once you have a borrowing card for the NOBLE system, you can visit, borrow books from, and use all services (except Interlibrary Loan) from the following academic libraries:

The Lawrence Public Library provides materials in Spanish, Vietnamese, French, Arabic, and several other languages. The Spanish collection includes encyclopedias, reference books, circulating books (fiction & non fiction), and magazines. The Lawrence Public Library is the only public library in Massachusetts that serves as a site for SABES (System for Adult Basic Education Support) materials. The materials in this collection are used by teachers and adult students looking for information about ESOL, literacy, reading, and math. There is also a Job Resource Center which contains information on careers, colleges, scholarships, financial aid, test preparation, resume writing, and job searching.

If you live in New Hampshire, you can use the Lawrence Public Library if you show proof of attending the Cambridge College Lawrence Center. Bring your Cambridge College student ID card as proof.

If you live in NH or in the 03 zip code of Maine, you can get a card for \$60/year. There are also some special categories for free cards so check the website <http://www.library.unh.edu/>
