For Cambridge College Students

Try an academic library at a local college

Why? Besides having large scholarly collections, academic libraries have strong collections in the subjects in which they give degrees. Check the college website for degree programs relevant to your subject area, and check the library website for special collections and to see if non-students can get borrowing privileges.

Try a local public library

Why? You will be able to borrow books and possibly order through interlibrary loan. Your local library is part of a system of public and some academic libraries. You may be surprised at how quickly the library can get a book for you.

Before going to any library

- Check the library's website and web catalog to see if it has what you want
- On the website, get the phone number for Information or Circulation, public hours, address, directions, and requirements for borrowing privileges
- ***Call Information or Circulation first to make sure it is open to the public on the day and time you want to go! Website information can be wrong on this!***
